1. WHEREAS the current qualifications for a driver's license consists of a state
2. determined number of hours driving with an adult over the age of 21,
3. having a learners permit for six months to one year, passing a vision test,

6. WHEREAS driving is filled with many dangers which can be minimized by requiring

13. and passing of a 20 hour minimum driving theory class which will include
14. identification of the major components of an engine.
15. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that classes will be funded by an additional federal tax on
16. gasoline sales, and/or higher state registration fees.

18. more hours of instruction from a trained and licensed adult over the age of
19. 21 at a state certified driving school.

A Bill to Arm Teachers

12. Safes must be monitored and only accessed by the individual teachers.
13. **SECTION 4.** This bill will take into effect in a calendar year after its passing, to allow
14. teachers to acquire their Gun License.
15. **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
16. void.

A Bill to Add Clarification to U.S. Patriot Act Section 215

BE IT ENACTED BY THIS CONGRESS THAT:

1. **SECTION 1.** To add clarity of having information not collected in
2. “bulk” and instead having only people under
3. investigation get information collected upon, with a
4. warrant as stated in the section.
5. **SECTION 2.** Bulk data is to be defined as records of people who have
6. connection to an investigation and that data collected
7. for the investigation is basically limitless. Relevance, in
8. the common law of evidence, is the tendency of a given
9. item of evidence to prove or disprove one of the legal
10. elements of the case, or to have probative value to
11. make one of the elements of the case likelier or not.
12. **SECTION 3.** Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act Court (FISC or
13. FISA) will make sure that these new clarifications to
14. now be followed and to uphold the First Amendment
15. and Fourth Amendment with these new clarifications.
16. **SECTION 4.** The implementation is to be done affective
17. immediately and all investigations underway are to
18. be altered to agree to these new clarifications.
19. **SECTION 5.** All other laws that are in conflict with this new policy
20. shall herby be declared null and void.

A BILL TO END THE PRACTICE OF CIVIL FORFEITURE

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. **SECTION 1.** The act of civil forfeiture will no longer be allowed in any or by any federal, state,
2. local, or municipal police force.
3. **SECTION 2.** Civil forfeiture, also known as asset forfeiture, administrative asset forfeiture, or
4. asset seizure, is to be defined as the confiscation of property or assets, liquid or otherwise, by
5. the government when it considers it a civil case, rather than a criminal case allowing the
6. government to take the property transferring the legal title to the government.
7. **SECTION 3.** Civil forfeiture will also be further defined as a process by which the government
8. can take and sell property without convicting, or charging, the former owner with a crime.
9. **SECTION 4.** In order for property to be seized in the future, the owner must be duly
10. charged, and the property in question can only be retained if a preponderance of evidence
11. points to its involvement in the crime, and cannot be sold until the person is convicted and the
12. criminal investigation completed. **SECTION 5.** In defense of all seized property, property
13. owners will be granted all legal protections extended to a defendant in a criminal case in order
14. to properly defend the ownership and retention of their property.
15. **SECTION 6.** The Department of Justice is to oversee the implementation of this legislation.
16. **SECTION 7.** This legislation will be implemented 90 days after its passage.
17. **SECTION 8.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

The Immigration Modernization Act of 2014

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. **SECTION 1.** Within 6 months of the bill's passage date, regardless of the date specified in
2. Section 6, the secretary of the U.S. Department of Homeland Security will be required to craft a
3. strategy to increase surveillance at all southern border sectors and to extend the existing barriers
4. along the U.S.-Mexico border so that they total 700 miles of barriers/fencing. The goal of the
5. strategy would be to have at least a 90 percent effectiveness rate.
6. **SECTION 2.** \$46.3 billion will be allocated for border enforcement.
7. **SECTION 3.** In order to be eligible for RPI status, a person must have been physically present
8. in the U.S. on or before Dec. 31, 2011, have maintained continuous presence up until the date of
9. application, have settled any assessed federal tax liability (including the payment of back taxes),
10. and not have been convicted of any felonies.
11. There will be a \$1000 fee for an RPI application
12. **SECTION 4.** Employers with more than 5,000 employees must begin using the EEVS, for
13. newly hired employees and employees with expiring work-authorization documents, within 2
14. years after the regulations are published.
15. **SECTION 5.** Before registered provisional immigrant (RPI) status is granted to unauthorized
16. immigrants, the DHS secretary must certify that implementation of the U.S.-Mexico border
17. strategy has begun.
18. **SECTION 6.** This Legislation will take effect 1 month after its passage.
19. **SECTION 7.** All regulations in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A RESOLUTION TO INTERVENE IN THE UKRAINE

1 **WHEREAS**, Russia's actions in the Ukraine threaten that country's independence, and

2 **WHEREAS**, Instability in that region threatens all countries, and

3 **WHEREAS**, Vladimir Putin has shown no inclination to change his course of action; now

4 Therefore be it

5 **RESOLVED**, That The United States of America officially allocate money, supplies, and troops

A BILL TO PROTECT THE CITIZENRY FROM HYDRAULIC FRACTURING

1. Be it enacted by this Student Congress that:
2. Section 1: The full text of the FRAC Act (H.R. 1921) is hereby passed.
4. Section 2: All hydraulic fracturing operations shall now be regulated under the Safe Water Drinking Act.
6. This bill shall take effect on December 30, 2014.

An Act to Criminalize Cyber-Bullying

1. Whereas any encouragement to harm or kill oneself made online to another person is a
2. significant threat to the health and welfare of the public,
3. Article I. If an individual encourages another person to kill oneself by using any electronic
4. medium, and such encouragement is a significant cause of the death of that person, the
5. individual who encourages such acts will be charged with Aggravated Cyber-Bullying with a
6. mandatory minimum sentence of 25 years to life in prison.
7. Article II. If an individual encourages another person to harm oneself, and such encouragement
8. is a significant cause of serious physical or emotional injury to that person, the individual
9. who encourages such acts will be charged with a Cyber-Bullying with a mandatory minimum
10. sentence of 5 years in prison.
11. Article III. Electronic medium shall include, but not limited to, all electronic medium, including
12. emails, Facebook, Twitter and Tumbler.
13. This bill will become effective December 1, 2014.

A Resolution to Abolish the Electoral College

1. Whereas, the Electoral College does not always represent the will of the people accurately in
2. presidential elections
3. Whereas, a system in which the presidential candidate receiving the most popular votes would
4. be fairer and more efficient
5. Resolved, that the United States abolish the Electoral College for all upcoming presidential
6. elections

A BILL TO DECREASE US FOREIGN OIL DEPENDANCY

Be it enacted by this Student Congress that:

Whereas the United States is equipped to minimize its dependency on foreign oil to significantly lower oil prices,

Whereas the United States will prosper both economically and socially from becoming independent from foreign oil sources,

Section 1: The United States will decrease its foreign oil imports by 1.5 million barrels per year.

Section 2: This legislation will be overseen by the U.S. Department of Energy.

Section 3: This bill will be implemented immediately if passed.

Section 4: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Reduce Carbon Emissions

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** A. Congress shall levy a tax on electricity companies, oil refiners, and other power-
3 generating companies at a rate of \$20 per ton of Carbon Dioxide (CO₂) emitted. This tax
4 rate shall increase by 4% each year for five years after implementation.

5 B. 50% of all revenues gained from this tax shall be allocated to investments in solar
6 energy, wind energy, hydropower, and other viable renewable energies.

7 **SECTION 2.** A “power-generating company” is an energy producer that emits over 100,000 tons of
8 CO₂ annually.

9 **SECTION 3.** A. The Department of Energy and the Department of Treasury shall jointly enforce
10 Section 1A.

11 B. The Department of Energy shall allocate the funds provided in Section 1B and shall
12 determine the most viable renewable energies.

13 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall take effect in Fiscal Year 2015.

14 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A BILL TO INCREASE COLLEGE ATTENDANCE

1. Be it enacted by this Student Congress that:
2. Section 1: The federal government will guarantee the repayment of qualifying student loans made by banks
3. to full-time students who are United States citizens matriculating at an accredited college or university
4. within the United States.
5. Section 2: All students who are the recipients of loans shall not be required to begin repayment until three
6. years from the date of graduation or attaining the age of twenty-five, whichever comes first.
7. Section 4: This bill will be implemented immediately if passed and shall expire upon the tenth anniversary
8. of its enactment.
9. Section 5: All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Reform Health Care

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. **SECTION 1.** The Affordable Care Act (ACA) is hereby repealed.
2. **SECTION 2.** This bill will take effect immediately.

A Bill to Reduce the Deficit

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. **SECTION 1.** Congress shall be required to pass an annual budget for each coming fiscal year.
2. **SECTION 2.** This budget will accurately reflect projected revenues.

4. **SECTION 4.** Both Houses of Congress must authorize deficit spending for a 2/3 majority.
5. **SECTION 5.** This bill will take effect in FY 2016.

A Resolution to Aid the Syrian Rebels

3: Whereas: The Syrian government has used chemical weapons on its own people

4: BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The United States shall give monetary and military

5: support to the Syrian rebels.

A Bill to Ban Flights from Countries with Ebola Outbreaks

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. **SECTION 1.** All flights to and from an Ebola-affected country and the United States
2. will be halted upon the reports of an Ebola outbreak in a country .
3. **SECTION 2.** This ban shall remain in effect for sixty (60) days after the last reported
4. case of Ebola in that country
5. **SECTION 3.** This law will be enforced by the Federal Aviation Administration upon
6. advice from the Centers for Disease Control.
7. **SECTION 5.** This bill will take effect immediately.

A Resolution to Aid the Syrian Rebels

1: Whereas: The United States has been a welcome home for immigrants from all lands and;

2: Whereas: Many come to this country seeking a better life and refuge from persecution and;

3: Whereas: We already have at least 11 million undocumented immigrants who cannot seek

4: justice because of their status.

5: BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The Congress shall prepare a plan to grant permanent legal status

6: to immigrants who have become a part of our society.

A Bill to Reduce Energy Costs

1. **SECTION 1.** The United States will begin negotiations with Canada to build
2. the Keystone XXL Pipeline.
3. **SECTION 2.** These negotiations will take place immediately.
