A Bill to Colonize Space

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The U.S. will administer a fund of five trillion dollars to the National Aeronautics and
3 Space Association. (NASA)

4 A. This fund will come partially from loans from other countries.

5 B. Other funds will come from the ILC tourism program. (further explained in
6 Section 4)

7 **SECTION 2.** NASA will be charged with the hiring and training of skilled scientists and engineers.

8 A. These workers will research and develop advanced methods of space travel
9 and human survivability in space.

10 **SECTION 3.** NASA will be charged with establishing a colony on the Moon. This colony will be called
11 the Interstellar Lunar Colony. (ILC)

12 A. The ILC will be capable to house and sustain humans for the action of
13 research and observation of the Moon and space.

14 B. The ILC will be armed with high-powered missiles armed with nuclear
15 warheads to strengthen U.S. National Security and to protect the ILC from both
16 natural and international crises.

17 C. The ILC will have security composed of groups of the U.S. armed forces.

18 D. The ILC will provide a staging ground for further exploration of space.

19 **SECTION 4.** The ILC will have a separate tourism program.

20 A. This program will be a source of revenue for the ILC and NASA.

21 B. This program will allow private citizens to take a three month long excursion
22 to the ILC, where the tourists will be able to tour the ILC under supervision of
23 the ILC security.

24 **SECTION 5.** This bill will go into effect immediately following the passage of this bill.

25 **SECTION 6:** Any U.S. law or regulation in conflict with this bill is hereby declared null and void.

26 **SECTION 7:** Any international law or regulation in conflict with this bill will no longer be viewed
27 as legitimate by the U.S.

A Resolution To Offer Incentives Such As Tax Breaks To Businesses That Provide Food In Areas That The United States Department Of Agriculture Classifies As “Food Deserts”

1 WHEREAS: The United States Department of Agriculture classifies food
2 deserts as “urban neighborhoods and rural towns without ready access to
3 fresh, healthy, and affordable food”. Instead of supermarkets and grocery
4 stores, these communities may have no food access or are served only by
5 fast food restaurants and convenience stores.

6 WHEREAS: The lack of access to healthy food by 23.5 million Americans in
7 these deserts perpetuates American diets based largely on processed, fast,
8 chemical laden, and unhealthy food that ultimately contribute to higher
9 levels of obesity and other diet-related diseases, such as diabetes and heart
10 disease that are both a detriment to the quality of an individual’s life and
11 cause them to accumulate hefty medical bills. This causes increasingly
12 poor, obese, and overweight Americans to find themselves in a seemingly
13 never-ending cycle of harmful food and health problems and medical costs.

14 WHEREAS: Obesity is the second leading preventable cause of death in the
15 United States.

16 THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE
17 ASSEMBLED THAT in order to prevent the life-threatening disease of
18 obesity that disproportionately affects low-income Americans, to offer
19 incentives such as tax breaks to establishments that offer fresh, healthy,
20 and affordable grocery options.

A Bill to Ban Caged Farming

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** Caged farming will be banned throughout the entirety of the nation. All cases of caged
3 farming shall be stopped within the next two years.

4 **SECTION 2.** Caged farming will be defined as farming in which livestock are raised in confined spaces
5 and in conditions intended to maximize production (i.e. battery cages) without concern
6 for the health and welfare of the livestock.

7 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of Agriculture will oversee the enforcement of this legislation.

8 **A.** Farms found to be cage farming will be fined \$1,000 per animal.

9 **B.** After three offenses, farmers will be prohibited from owning or running a farm.

10 **C.** After being shut down, a farm may be fined an additional \$3,000 to \$15,000
11 depending on the severity of the offense.

12 **SECTION 4.** This bill will be put into effect on March 4th, 2016.

13 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Halt Civil Asset Forfeiture Abuse

1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:**

2 **Section 1:** Title 18, Section 981 is amended to require that any and all
3 applications of Civil Asset Forfeiture by any Government entity within
4 the United States shall heretofore be subject to the legal criterion for
5 lawful search and seizure established by the Fourth Amendment to
6 the United States Constitution.

7 **Section 2:** "Civil Asset Forfeiture" is defined as seizure by law enforcement or
8 Government officials of property they assert to be involved in criminal
9 activity, regardless of the possessor's perceived guilt or innocence of a
10 crime, absent charge, probable cause, and/or warrant; the
11 Constitutional Fourth Amendment mandate for legal seizure is
12 subverted by charging the property itself with a crime.

13 **Section 3:** The Department of Justice and the Office of the Attorney General will
14 be jointly responsible for the implementation and enforcement of this
15 legislation.

16 **Section 4:** This law shall take effect immediately upon passage.

17 **Section 5:** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
18 void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Allow for Sensible Gun Ownership

1 **BE IT RESOLVED BY TWO-THIRDS OF THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:**

2 That the following article is proposed as an amendment to the
3 Constitution of the United States, which shall be valid to all intents and
4 purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of
5 three-fourths of the several states within seven years from the date of its
6 submission by the Congress:

7 **SECTION 1.** The Second Amendment to the Constituion shall be amended to read “As
8 a strong military is necessary to the security of a free state, the right of
9 the people to keep and bear arms when actively engaged in the security
10 of the state shall not be abridged.”

11 **SECTION 2.** The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate
12 legislation.

A BILL TO ENACT PRESUMED ORGAN DONATION IN ORDER TO SAVE LIVES

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** All United States citizens 19 years old or over are presumed organ donors
3 unless they “opt out.”

4 **SECTION 2.** Any United States citizen between the ages of 18 years and 19 years shall
5 remain “opt in,” meaning her or she must legally sign a document stating
6 that he or she wishes to donate his or her organs. The reason for this
7 year waiting period is so that citizens will have time after becoming a
8 legal adult to decide whether to “opt out” or not.

9 **SECTION 3.** The laws regarding organ donation shall remain the same for those under
10 the age of 18.

11 **SECTION 4.** No citizen may make the decision for another citizen, except in the case
12 of a citizen with a mental disorder that interferes with his or her
13 conscious decision processes. In such cases, the next of kin of the
14 affected citizen may decide.

15 **SECTION 5.** The method to “opt out” shall be the same as current methods of “opt
16 in” in each state.

17 **SECTION 6.** This law will take effect thirty days after upon passage.

18 **SECTION 7.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are null and void upon its passage.

A Bill to Preserve the Ability to Opt Out

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The Privacy Impact Assessment Update for Transpiration Security
3 Administration Advanced Imaging Technology of December 18, 2015 is
4 hereby rescinded. Any air traveler has the ability to opt out of AIT
5 scanning at any time.

6 **SECTION 2.** If the traveler choosed to opt out, they will receive an enhanced pat-
7 down in accordance with previous Transportation Security Administration
8 rules.

9 **SECTION 3.** The Transportation Security Administration will train airport security
10 agents in proper procedures to ensure travelers who wish to opt out are
11 treated with dignity
12 space.

13 **SECTION 4.** This bill will take effect immediately upon passage.

14 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and voice.

A Bill to Return to the Gold Standard

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** A Congressional audit, with the assistance of the Secretary of the
3 Treasury and the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System shall
4 determine the value of the United States gold reserve, as well as the
5 difference between that and the value of all United States currency.

6 **SECTION 2.** The Secretary of the Treasury shall purchase the difference in gold to
7 back currency not covered therein.

8 **SECTION 3.** The provisions of this bill shall take effect January 1, 2017.

9 **SECTION 4.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Legalize All Controlled Substances

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** A. All controlled substances prohibited by the Drug Enforcement Administration, and
3 the Food and Drug Administration are hereby legalized.

4 B. All offenders currently imprisoned for a nonviolent drug crime are to be released.

5 **SECTION 2.** Controlled substances shall be defined as Schedules I, II, III, IV, and V substances as
6 listed by the Controlled Substance Act Scheduling.

7 **SECTION 3.** The Drug Enforcement Administration and the Food and Drug Administration shall
8 oversee the implication of this bill.

9 **SECTION 4.** This piece of legislation shall go into full effect no later than one year after passage.

10 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Repeal the First Amendment

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **RESOLVED,** By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article is
3 proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States, which shall
4 be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution when ratified by
5 the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states within seven years from
6 the date of its submission by the Congress:

7 **ARTICLE --**

8 **SECTION 1.** The First Amendment of the Constitution of the United States is hereby
9 repealed.

A Bill to Ban Prescription Drug Advertisements

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** All direct to consumer (DTC) advertisements for prescription medications in the
3 United States are hereby declared illegal.

4 **SECTION 2.** Each violation of this legislation is subject to a \$250,000 fine requiring payment
5 within the fiscal year said violation occurs.

6 **SECTION 3.** The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) in conjunction with the Food and
7 Drug Administration (FDA) shall enforce this legislation.

8 **SECTION 4.** This law will take effect within 12 months of passage.

9 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Amend the Constitution to Require a Two-Thirds Vote on the Raising or Lowering of the Debt Ceiling

1 **RESOLVED,** By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the following article
2 is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the United States,
3 which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the Constitution
4 when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states
5 within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:

ARTICLE --

7 **SECTION 1:** All legislation for raising or lowering the federal
8 government's budget debt ceiling shall require the passage
9 of a two-thirds majority vote in the House of
10 Representatives and in the Senate.

11 **SECTION 2:** The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by
12 appropriate legislation.

A Bill to End Civil Commitments for Sexual Offenders

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** Section 4248 of Title 18 is hereby repealed.

3 **SECTION 2.** This legislation will go into effect on January 1, 2018.

4 **SECTION 3.** On January 1, 2018, Individuals in custody pursuant to section 4248 shall
5 be released from custody unless one of the following conditions apply:

6 (1) If a sovereign government has begun civil commitment
7 proceedings against the individual, the individual shall be
8 transferred to the custody of that sovereign.

9 (2) If a detainer has been filed against that individual, the
10 individual shall be transferred in accordance with that
11 detainer.

12 **SECTION 4.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution to Encourage Diplomacy

- 1 **WHEREAS,** The United States government sends many troops to foreign countries; and
- 2 **WHEREAS,** Many troops die on foreign soil, for a cause that they do not choose to die for, but that
3 the government creates for them; and
- 4 **WHEREAS,** The inhabitants of other countries feel threatened and insecure because of the presence
5 of American troops; and
- 6 **WHEREAS,** The presence of American troops may act to provoke terrorist organizations and other
7 crime related organizations; now, therefore, be it
- 8 **RESOLVED,** That the Congress here assembled make the following recommendation for solution
9 that the United States call back all troops and not send any troops to foreign countries
10 to solve any foreign affair; and, be it
- 11 **FURTHER RESOLVED,** That the United States will only send diplomatic representatives to deal with any
12 foreign relation or affair.

A Bill to Provide Visas for Foreign Military Translators

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** Visas will be provided to foreign military aides and their families.

3 **SECTION 2.** “Foreign Military Aide” will be defined as any foreign national who works
4 extensively with the United States Military abroad.

5 **SECTION 3. A.** Section 602(b) of the Afghan Allies Protection Act will be expanded to include
6 the entire Middle East.

7 **B.** An additional 10,000 visas will be created for the purposes of the program.

8 **C.** This bill will be overseen by the Department of State.

9 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect immediately upon passage.

10 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Shift the American Position on the Palestine-Israel Conflict

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** A. United States military aid to Israel shall be eliminated.

3 B. This military aid will be reinstated if and when the Israeli Defense
4 Forces (IDF) remove all military checkpoints and outposts from the West
5 Bank, with the exception of checkpoints on the border between the West
6 Bank and Israel.

7 C. By working with the allies in the Middle East and the Palestinian
8 Authority, the United States shall seek to have an unarmed member of
9 Hamas at the next round of US-led negotiations between Israeli and
10 Palestinian negotiators.

11 **SECTION 2.** "Military aid" shall be defined as any monetary, physical, or advisory aid
12 given to the Israeli Defense Forces. The Israeli intelligence service,
13 Mossad, shall be exempt from this legislation.

14 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Defense and Department of State will oversee the
15 implementation of this legislation.

16 **SECTION 4.** This legislation shall take effect immediately.

17 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Strengthen the Animal Welfare Act

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The Animal Welfare Act, 7 U.S.C. § 2123 *et seq.*, is amended to classify
3 retail pet stores as animal dealers subject to regulation under the Act.

4 **SECTION 2.** Retail pet stores are prohibited from selling animals acquired from
5 commercial breeders.

6 **SECTION 3.** “Commercial breeders” are defined as sellers who mate animals primarily
7 for profit, rather than for the promotion or preservation of a particular
8 breed or species of animal.

9 **SECTION 4.** The United States Department of Agriculture will oversee enforcement of
10 this legislation, and will regulate and inspect retail pet shops for
11 compliance.

12 **SECTION 5.** This bill will take effect August 1, 2016.

13 **SECTION 6.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Amend the Pledge of Allegiance

1 **BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:**

2 **Section 1:** Title 4, Section 4 of the United States Code is amended by striking the
3 words “under God.”

4 **Section 2:** This law shall take effect immediately upon passage.

5 **Section 3:** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
6 void.

A Resolution to Abolish Trials as Adults for Minors

1. WHEREAS: Developmental research does not provide a clear cut boundary
2. between adulthood and adolescence.
3. WHEREAS: It is shown that adolescents cannot control their impulses or foresee
4. the consequences of their actions as adequately as adults can.
5. WHEREAS: Rehabilitation is more beneficial to address than punishment for
7. WHEREAS: Studies show that children tried in adult courts are more likely to be 8.
9. WHEREAS: In states such as Florida that allow minors to be prosecuted as
10. adults have the highest juvenile crime rates.
11. THEREFORE: Be it resolved by the Student Congress here assembled, that trials as adults
12. for minors are unjust.

SUPERSESSION

A Bill to Make Concealed Handgun Laws Regarding Issuing of Permits Shall-Issue

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** In order to protect the rights outlined by the Second Amendment to the
3 constitution, laws regarding the issuing of concealed carry permits shall
4 now be under the “shall-issue” jurisdiction.

5 **Section 2.** Concealed weapon refers to a weapon, lethal or non lethal, that is able to
6 be concealed on one’s person or in close proximity. The Second
7 Amendment states that “the right of the people to keep and bear arms,
8 shall not be infringed.” Shall issue category refers to the policy in which a
9 person must carry a license to carry a concealed handgun, but where
10 granting of such licenses is subject only to the criteria laid out by law and
11 the authority granting this has no discretion in the granting of licenses.

12 **Section 3.** The congress of the united states will make policies regarding concealed
13 carry. Requests for permits, background checks, and, if necessary,
14 evaluation of other criteria shall be managed by the bureau of alcohol,
15 tobacco, firearms and explosives. Additionally, once the law comes into
16 effect, there will be a review of current owners of concealed carry
17 permits. The review of current owners of concealed carry permits and
18 pending requests for permits will be overseen by the bureau of alcohol,
19 tobacco, firearms, and explosives.

20 **Section 4.** Legislation regarding the new federal policy will come into affect by the
21 beginning of the next fiscal year.

22 **Section 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Amend the Unlawful Internet Gambling Enforcement Act of 2006

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** Section 5362 of the Unlawful Internet Gambling Enforcement Act of 2006 shall now
3 include

4 **A.** Electronic Daily Fantasy Sports are considered unlawful

5 **B.** Randomized electronic packs are considered unlawful

6 **SECTION 2.** **A.** Electronic Daily Fantasy Sports is defined as competitions that are conducted over
7 short-term periods, such as a week or single day where individuals pay a fee to compete
8 against others by building a team of professional athletes from a particular league or
9 competition, and earn points based on the actual statistical performance of the players
10 in real-world competitions.

11 **B.** Randomized Electronic Packs shall be defined as purchased electronic items that
12 contain an assortment of electronic items of value selected by chance. Typically found
13 using the term "Card-Pack."

14 **SECTION 3.** Individual State's Gaming Control Boards shall be responsible for the enforcement of
15 this legislation

16 **SECTION 4.** This law goes into effect on January 1, 2017.

17 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Establish a Corporate Tax Holiday

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **Section 1.** Companies willing to repatriate their foreign earnings to the united states
3 will have those foreign earnings taxed at a reduced rate of 10%, rather
4 than the standard corporate tax rate.

5 (A) All earned revenue from the 10% tax shall go toward the
6 establishment of a national infrastructure bank.

7 (B) At least 50% of repatriated funds must be spent on at least 3
8 of the following categories: increased hiring, wages, pensions,
9 research and development, environmental improvements, or
10 public-private partnerships.

11 © Companies that repatriate will be barred from sending money
12 overseas or inverting for 10 years after participating in this
13 program, those that do must repay the tax incentive with interest.

14 **Section 2.** To be eligible for the 10% tax rate:

15 (A) The repatriation must exceed each company's average
16 repatriations in recent years.

17 (B) The repatriated funds must have been earned in 2015 or
18 earlier.

19 **Section 3.** This legislation will go into effect june 30, 2016. Companies will have up
20 to 5 years to complete the transfer of foreign earnings.

21 **Section 4.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Resolution Expressing Opposition to Plea Bargaining

1 **WHEREAS,** A substantial majority of citizens are denied their basic constitutional
2 procedural right to a jury trial due to overuse of plea bargains
3 by prosecutors, and;

4 **WEHREAS,** Plea bargains functionally deny individuals their day in court and their
5 opportunity to prove their innocence and to clear their name, and;

6 **WHEREAS,** The current public defender system is substantially overstretched and as
7 a result defendants are often coerced into accepting plea bargains
8 offered by prosecutors; and

9 **WHEREAS,** prosecutors are able to exploit the asymmetry created by overworked
10 public defenders, making it rational for a defendant to accept a plea
11 bargain even when they may be innocent or when the state lacks
12 evidence to safely prove culpability beyond a reasonable doubt at trial

13 **THEREFORE** BE IT RESOLVED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:
14 That prosecutors ought not use plea bargains and should instead either
15 bring cases to trial or elect not to press charges
16

A Bill to Reject the Paris Agreement

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** All branches of the United States federal government, and departments
3 operating therein are hereby barred from using any federal monies to
4 comply with, implement, or otherwise achieve the aims of the Paris
5 Agreement as outlined during the 2015 United Nationals Climate Change
6 Conference.

7 **SECTION 2.** Some of the aims of the Paris Agreement include, but are not limited to,
8 limiting global warming to two degrees Celsius and reducing carbon
9 emissions as quickly as possible.

10 **SECTION 3.** Each department and agency within the Executive Branch will be required
11 to submit a report to the House Committee on Science, Space, and
12 Technology demonstrating that they have not spend any federal monies
13 on implementing the Paris Agreement. Failure to comply will be
14 considered contempt of Congress.

15 **SECTION 4.** This will take effect on passage. The first reports shall be due on July 1,
16 2016.

17 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Authorize Metadata Collection from Social Networks

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The National Security Agency (NSA) is authorized to collect data from
3 Internet based social networks for the purposes of terrorism prevention.
4 Such information will be provided upon request of the NSA regardless of
5 the issuance of a warrant.

6 **SECTION 2.** Internet based social networks are defined as a dedicated website or
7 other application that enables users to communicate with each other by
8 posting information, comments, messages, images, etc..

9 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Defense and the Director of National Intelligence will
10 coordinate efforts to ensure that such metadata is collected from each
11 network or website and is properly analyzed for information related to
12 terrorism prevention.

13 **SECTION 4.** These collections will begin upon passage.

14 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Amend the Taiwan Relations Act

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 **SECTION 1.** The Taiwan Relations Act (Pub. L. 96-8) is amended to include the
3 following language: All weapons sales to the Republic of China (ROC,
4 Taiwan) shall be immediately halted. No weaponry of an offensive or
5 defensive nature may be provided to the ROC from this point forward.

6 **SECTION 2.** The most recent sales to Taiwan, as identified by the December 16, 2015
7 notification to Congress, shall be rescinded. All payments received from
8 the ROC shall be returned.

9 **SECTION 3.** The Department of Defense and the Department of State shall be
10 responsible for enforcement of this legislation.

11 **SECTION 4.** This shall take effect immediately upon passage.

12 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
