

A Bill to Support Nigeria's Military to Combat Boko Haram

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 SECTION 1. A. The United States Department of Defense shall inspect military
2 purchases by the Federal Republic of Nigeria, and if able to
3 determine the purchase is appropriate, have the option to
4 reimburse purchases.

5 SECTION 2. The Department of Defense shall oversee the implementation of
6 this legislation.

7 A. \$5 billion USD shall be allocated for this bill, and any remaining
8 shall go back into the general budget.

9 B. The Department of Defense shall provide a report on the progress of
10 this legislation at least once per fiscal year, and if it is determined
11 that human rights abuses have been committed by Nigeria's military,
12 all funding shall be scaled down over a period of 6 months.

13 SECTION 3. This bill shall go into passage on December 31st, 2016.

14 SECTION 4. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
15 and void.

A Bill to Distribute a Common National Identity Card

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **SECTION 1.** Seeing as insufficient information is available as to the existence or extent of
2 voter fraud, and previous proposals have suggested requiring driver's
3 licenses, which are concentrated among wealthier groups and caucasians,
4 the United States government shall issue a Common Identification Card to
5 all legal residents and citizens.

6 **SECTION 2.** In order to stymie future debate on this matter and prevent future
7 discrimination against underprivileged minorities, the Common ID shall be
8 the only requirement at polling places (including state elections). Naturally,
9 they shall be photo ID's, printed with the latest anticounterfeit techniques,
10 and photos shall be updated every two years. This photo service will be
11 available at public libraries, schools, and community centers.

12 **SECTION 3.** Upon passing of this bill, design committees employed by the Department of
13 Health and Human Services will get to the drawing boards and agree upon a national
14 design in all all haste. A standard space will be left for each state to leave its distinct
15 markings and logos for residents within their borders. Two years after the designs are
16 submitted, the ID's shall be distributed staggeredly over the course of one month (30
17 days) via mail.

18 **SECTION 4.** It shall be law that these Common ID's be accepted at every venue for every
19 purpose as acceptable identification guaranteed by the United States
20 government.

21 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A Bill to Ban Assault Weapons

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1 **SECTION 1.** The sale, transfer, manufacturing, and importation of the following weapons

2 is prohibited:

3 A. All semiautomatic rifles that can accept a detachable magazine and have
4 at least one military feature: pistol grip; forward grip; folding, telescoping,
5 or detachable stock; grenade launcher or rocket launcher; barrel shroud;
6 or threaded barrel.

7 B. All semiautomatic pistols that can accept a detachable magazine and
8 have at least one military feature: threaded barrel; second pistol grip;
9 barrel shroud; capacity to accept a detachable magazine at some location
10 outside of the pistol grip; or semiautomatic version of an automatic
11 firearm.

12 C. All semiautomatic rifles and handguns that have a fixed magazine with
13 the capacity to accept more than 10 rounds.

14 D. All semiautomatic shotguns that have a folding, telescoping, or
15 detachable stock; pistol grip; fixed magazine with the capacity to accept
16 more than 5 rounds; ability to accept a detachable magazine; forward grip;
17 grenade launcher or rocket launcher; or shotgun with a revolving cylinder.

18 E. All ammunition feeding devices (magazines, strips, and drums) capable
19 of accepting more than 10 rounds

20 F. 157 specifically-named firearms (listed at the end of this legislation).

21 **SECTION 2.** This legislation excludes the following weapons from the bill:

22 A. Any weapon that is lawfully possessed at the date of the bill's
23 enactment;

24 B. Any firearm manually operated by a bolt, pump, lever, or slide action; C.
25 Assault weapons used by military, law enforcement, and retired law
26 enforcement;

27 D. Antique weapons; and

28 E. Hunting and sporting rifles and shotguns as specified by Senator Dianne
29 Feinstein's "Assault Weapons Ban of 2013"

30 **SECTION 3.** Background checks will be required on all sales or transfers of a grandfathered
31 assault weapon. This check can be run through the FBI, or, if a state

33 chooses, initiated with a state agency, as with the existing background
34 check system.

35 **SECTION 4.** The sale or transfer of large-capacity ammunition feeding devices lawfully
36 possessed on the date of enactment of the bill is prohibited.

37 **SECTION 5.** States and localities shall be permitted to use federal Byrne JAG grant funds
38 to conduct a voluntary buy-back program for grandfathered assault
39 weapons and large-capacity ammunition feeding devices.

40 **SECTION 6.** All assault weapons and large-capacity ammunition feeding devices
41 manufactured after the date of the bill's enactment must be engraved with
42 the serial number and date of manufacture of the weapon.

43 **SECTION 7.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby deemed null and void.
