A RESOLUTION TO REGULATE CAFFEINE

1	Whereas:	The Food and Drug Administration has not yet claimed caffeine as a drug
2		and;
3	Whereas:	The Nutritional Facts Panel on food labels are not required to include
4		recommended dietary information, since the FDA identifies caffeine as a
5		natural chemical and not a nutrient, and;
6	Whereas:	Caffeine has been proven to be very addictive, and;
7	Whereas:	Caffeine has many side-effects, including promoting calcium release,
8		antagonizing adenosine receptors, and affecting brain functions such as
9		sleep, cognition, learning, and memory, therefore
10	Be it resolve	d by the Student Congress here assembled that:
11	A.	Caffeine be declared both a medical and non-medical drug;
12	В.	Only 500 mg of caffeine is legal to consume in one day, and;
13	C.	There should be at least one test for caffeine in worker's urine every six
14		months.

A BILL TO INCREASE FOREIGN AID TO PACIFIC ALLIANCE COUNTRIES

1	Section 1.	Pacific Alliance countries are essential allies to the United States in the
2		Latin American region. Foreign aid will be increased to \$2 billion in
3		economic aid for each member country. The primary focus of the aid will
4		be improving infrastructure.
5	Section 2.	Pacific Alliance: The Latin American trade bloc consisting of Chile,
6		Colombia, Mexico, and Peru.
7	Section 3.	The Department of State will oversee implementation of this legislation.
8	Section 4.	This bill will take effect on January 1, 2018.
9	Section 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

A BILL TO BAN THE USE OF RECREATIONAL HELIUM

1	Section 1.	Helium in balloons and any other recreational use is banned.
2	Section 2.	Recreational helium is defined as any sort of helium that is not used for
3		scientific purposes.
4	Section 3.	The United States Department of Health and Human Services will oversee
5		the enforcement of this bill, including issuing a \$5000 fine for any
6		infraction.
7	Section 4.	This bill will go into effect 6 months after passing the bill.
8	Section 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
