4	WHEREAS, a criminal record on the individual running for office is a bad
5	representation that area and,
6	WHEREAS, sexual allegations are more prevalent than ever and victims of such
7	assault have felt more comfortable with speaking out against their assaulters and,
8	WHEREAS, sexual assault is a serious crime showing corruption a lack of
9	morals and,
10	WHEREAS, sexual allegations usually come up after someone has won office
11	and,
12	WHEREAS, a sexual assault case shows that the person's morals have been
13	corrupted which can result in making bad decisions and,

A Bill for Responsible Handgun Ownership

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1**. Citizens legally entitled to carry firearms shall be allowed to do so.
- 2 **SECTION 2**. No state, municipality, or empowered government authority shall
- deny a concealed carry permit to any US citizen who meets the following
- 4 requirements:
- 5 proof of residency within the state, minimum age, fingerprints for a background
- 6 check, no record of mental illness or adjudication of mental defect by a court,
- 7 proof or certification from an acceptable handgun safety class (including live-fire
- 8 range qualification exercises to demonstrate safe and acceptable proficiency), and
- 9 submitting the required application fee.
- 10 **SECTION 3.** Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF)
- 11 oversee the enforcement of the bill.
- 12 **SECTION 4.** This bill will immediately take effect upon passage.
- 13 **SECTION 5.** Laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and
- 14 void.

Round 3

<u>A Bill to Require Life Education Curriculum in</u> <u>Secondary Schooling</u>

Submitted by Servite High School

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED:

- 1 **SECTION 1:** All secondary schools will require students to take at least two
- 2 years of life education alongside standard academia in order to graduate, helping
- 3 to prepare youth for average life by teaching them skills and information which
- 4 will facilitate survival in the modern world
- 5 **SECTION 2:** Life skills will defined as any skill or knowledge not utilized in the
- 6 classroom setting, but required by life to be a functioning part of society. These
- 7 include getting and maintaining a job, automotive maintenance, writing a
- 8 résumé, stock investment, etc.
- 9 **SECTION 3:** Schools will be required to provide a one year overview of national
- 10 and local laws. State laws taught will be dependent on location based on state,
- 11 county, city, etc.
- 12 **SECTION 4:** This bill will be enacted by August of 2021 to allow for the
- 13 thorough construction and vetting of a curriculum

A Resolution to Ban use of Non-Organic Pesticides

- WHEREAS, non- organic pesticides can be toxic to humans and can build up in the
 human body contributing significantly to disease; and
- 3 WHEREAS, 547 average deaths a year have been related to pesticide poisoning; and
- 4 **WHEREAS,** organophosphate-induced protein deformation, Alzheimer's and related 5 diseases have been frequently related to causes from non- organic pesticides;
- 6 WHEREAS, mental instability has also been a side effect of pesticides running into
 7 drinking water;
- 8 Therefore be it RESOLVED, that all non-organic pesticides be replaced with organic
 9 or natural pesticides.

<u>A Resolution to Ban Bump Stocks</u> Submitted by Alhambra High School

1	WHEREAS, we are in a time where mass shootings are more prevalent than
2	ever; and
3	WHEREAS, thousands of people have died at the fault of mass shootings; and
4	WHEREAS, banning the bump stock bill will adequately decrease the number
5	of victims in any mass shooting scenario; and
6	WHEREAS, bump stocks increase the rate of fire for any weapons; and
7	WHEREAS, the Republicans and various interest groups such as the NRA have
8	shown that they are willing to negotiate solutions due to the current situation
9	WHEREAS, they are a violation of the gun regulations on automatic and semi-
10	automatic weapons and,
11	WHEREAS, this contradicts regulations that we have spent years of crafting;
12	therefore
13	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED,
14	that the United States Federal Government will ban bump 10 stocks to decrease
15	the amount of casualties from modified weaponry.

<u>A Bill for Native American Tribal Representation in the</u> <u>House</u>

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS 1 HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

SECTION 1. Each Native American tribe shall have a representative in the House of 2 Representatives.

SECTION 2. A tribe shall be defined as a traditional Native American group living on 4 a reservation and recognized as such by the United States' Bureau of Indian Affairs.

SECTION 3. Each tribe will determine a means of selecting a single representative to 6 the House of Representatives, be it through election, appointment, or any other means 7 it sees fit.

SECTION 4. This law shall take effect upon the opening of the 116th United States 9 Congress, in January 2019.

SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and 11 void.

Final Round

A Bill to Repeal the Affordable Care Act **BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:**

 SECTION 1. The United States shall repeal the Affordable Care Act.
 SECTION 2. The Affordable Care Act is The Patient Protection and Affordable Care 3 Act of 2010, in its entirety.

4. SECTION 3. The U.S. Department of Health & Human Services shall oversee this 5. act.

6. SECTION 4. This law shall take effect July 1, 2018

7. SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and 8. void.

<u>A Bill to Limit the Growth of Self Proclaimed "Sanctuary</u> <u>Cities"</u>

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1.** The United States Congress will end the awarding of federal grants to the
- 2 current and future: localities, cities, counties, and states that identify themselves as a
- 3 sanctuary for illegal and undocumented immigrants.
- 4 **SECTION 2.** Sanctuary cities are those localities, cities, counties, and states with
- 5 policies that make themselves a safe-haven for an undocumented immigrant.
- 6 **SECTION 3.** The U.S. Department of Commerce will work in conjunction with the U.S.
- 7 Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to enforce the termination of grants to the self 8 proclaimed "sanctuary cities."
- 9 A. The U.S. Department of Commerce will oversee the end of grants to the localities.
- B. The U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) will oversee the identification ofsanctuary cities.
- 12 **SECTION 4.** This bill will go into effect at the end of the fiscal year on 1 October 2018.
- 13 **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.
