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#### 2017 MINNEAPPLE CONGRESSIONAL DEBATE

**Rules/Procedures:** The MinneApple uses NSDA rules for speeches and procedure. Students set agendas upon a majority vote in each preliminary chamber based on the items in the docket released on the tournament website. Legislation debated during a previous session may not continue into subsequent sessions (so, if there were three speeches on bill X toward the end of session 1, session 2 must start with bill Y).



**Advancement and Finals:** Students advance to elimination rounds based on cumulative rank totals from judges, using NSDA tournament procedures for tabulating ranks. We will break about one-third of the preliminary session field to semifinal chambers of 9-12 students, and a final session chamber of 10-14 students. **Semifinal and final round legislation** information will be released October 20. Direct questioning will be used for the final round.

#### Awards/TOC Bid Level:

The top six students will receive MinneApple apple awards, the remaining final session participants will receive an award. The top PO from each preliminary chamber -- as well as the final session PO -- will receive a gavel. New in 2017: all final round contestants earn one bid/leg to the University of Kentucky Tournament of Champions.

#### Student Leadership Award:

While student vote will not determine the outcome of the tournament, a special award modeled after the NSDA National Tournament "Leadership Bowl" will be conferred upon one final round debater who earns preferential ranking by his/her peers, in addition to final round observers. All observer ballots will be tallied at one-quarter strength of contestant ballots.

**Schedule:** Congressional Debate will be hosted at Falcon Ridge Middle School for all rounds. The break to semifinals will depend on the total number of entries. Registration for each division will take place at Apple Valley HS. Shuttle buses will be available to take competitors to Falcon Ridge Middle School Friday after the opening announcements (see schedule). Judges can report directly to each site but will not be allowed in the Middle School until 3:15pm. Remember, all judges are obligated for the final session, regardless of whether their student(s) advance(s).

#### A Bill to End Plan Colombia

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1**. The United States government shall cut all funding for the Plan Colombia program.
- **SECTION 2.** Plan Colombia is a US military aid program to Colombia to fight drug cartels and insurgent groups
- **SECTION 3.** This bill will be overseen by the US Department of State.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented immediately.
- SECTION 5. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

## A Bill to Raise the Excise Tax on Gasoline to Save the Highway Trust Fund

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1**. Excise Taxes on gasoline are increased to 25 cents per gallon for gasoline and 30 cents per gallon on diesel fuel.
- **SECTION 2**. All funds collected by the stated tax shall go to the Highway Trust Fund
- SECTION 3. The Internal Revenue Service will now collect excise taxes at the previously stated rate. The Department of Transportation's Federal Highway Administration shall oversee the allocation of funds from the Highway Trust Fund.
- **SECTION 4.** This bill will be implemented immediately upon passage
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. Introduced for Congressional Debate by Hawken School

### A Bill to Administer Economic Sanctions on Venezuela to Promote Human Rights

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- **SECTION 1**. The United States will now cease all economic trade with the nation of Venezuela.
- **SECTION 2**. Economic trade includes, but is not limited to, the sectors of petroleum, manufacturing, and food products.
- USAID will oversee the implementation of this legislation. If the economic sanctions are found to negatively impact the people of Venezuela, USAID will send \$25 million in food and health assistance to the people of Venezuela.
- **SECTION 4.** This legislation will be implemented one week after passage.
- **SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void. Introduced for Congressional Debate by Hawken School

# A Resolution to Ban Bump-Stocks to Alleviate Preventable Gun Violence

1	WHEREAS,	Bump-stocks are modifications that allow semi-automatic weapons to fire
2		at higher rates that stimulate automatic weapons, which are illegal and
3		far more difficult to obtain; and
4	WHEREAS,	This is creating societal danger within the US as it it impacts more than 80
5		Americans killed in gun suicides and homicides every single day; and
6	WHEREAS,	Automatic weapons have been illegal in the United States for more than
7		30 years, bump-stocks provide a loophole to this restriction. Congress
8		needs to act to save the Americans who are also killed every day with
9		guns, not just the victims of rate and horrific mass shootings; and
10	WHEREAS,	Because the only reason to fire so many rounds so fast is to kill large
11		numbers of people, no one should be able to easily and cheaply modify
12		legal weapons into what are essentially machine guns; now, therefore, be
13		it
14	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled ban bump-stocks to help end
15		preventable gun violence.

# A Resolution to Sanction Myanmar to Reduce Violence to the Rohingyas

1	WHEREAS,	The Rohingya Muslims are being actively persecuted in Myanmar and the	
2		government is refusing to recognize them as one of the country's ethnic	
3		groups; and	
4	WHEREAS,	1.1 million Rohingya Muslims are currently living in southeast Asia and	
5		over 500,000 Rohingya Muslims have fled to Bangladesh and around	
6		1,000 may have been killed in Myanmar, meaning that a continuation of	
7		the persecution may lead to more deaths and add to the immigration	
8		crisis; and	
9	WHEREAS,	the Rohingya rights to practice their own religion, study, travel and marry	
10		have been restricted. They cannot get a citizenship as a Rohingya	
11		Muslims, which makes it so they cannot enter certain professions such as	
12		law or medicine; therefore, be it	
13	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled sanction Myanmar to reduce violence	
14		to the Rohingyas.

# A Resolution to Replace Nuclear Fission with Nuclear Fusion to Have a Cleaner and Stronger Energy Source

1	WHEREAS,	Nuclear Fission poses a huge risk: long-lived radioactive nuclear waste,
2		difficulty to control it, harmful health effects on the population, serious
3		nuclear accidents and overall lack of safety; and
4	WHEREAS,	When over 30 countries rely on the use of nuclear power, they must
5		make sure they are using the most efficient and less detrimental source.
6		Because countries need a better alternative source than fossil fuels,
7		nuclear fission is too risky. Nuclear fusion, on the other hand, produces
8		four times as much energy as fission, is easier to control and stop, has
9		shorter-lived nuclear waste, and is much safer; and
10	WHEREAS,	Chernobyl and Fukushima have examples in the past of where these
11		nuclear fission plants caused immediate deaths and long-term troubles
12		where people are still facing those consequences today with infinite
13		cases of cancer. Nuclear fusion serves as a safer, cleaner and more
14		efficient tool, producing more power, and lasting longer.
15	WHEREAS,	Nuclear fusion does produce radioactive waste, which is the one of the
16		biggest problems. However, in contrast to fission produced wastes, they
17		are short lived and decay to background levels in a very short time; and
18	WHEREAS,	Nuclear fusion will replace fission by 2028; now, therefore, be it
19	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled replace nuclear fusion with nuclear
20		fission for a more efficient and better source.

# A Resolution to Increase THAAD missile defense in Japan to protect it from North Korea

1	WHEREAS,	The increasing threat of nuclear war is impending upon us now more
2		than ever; and we must take action to defend our ally.
3	WHEREAS,	The THAAD system is one of our best defenses against nuclear weapons
4		and increasing defense is our best option; and it will be used to defend
5		our ally Japan.
6	WHEREAS,	South Korea, Japan, and Guam have all been targeted by North Korea and
7		it's our moral duty to protect the ally with a bigger population.
8	WHEREAS,	The THAAD system is unreliable and adding more increases our chance of
9		hitting the warheads before they strike our ally. Our allies populated
10		areas also have a higher chance of survival.
11	WHEREAS,	Japan is one of our strongest allies and we need to make sure they are
12		well protected because of their strategic position against our enemies
13		and our history; now, therefore, be it
14	RESOLVED,	Increase missile defense in Japan to protect our ally.

### A Bill to Rev up Revenue

1	BE IT ENACTE	D BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2	SECTION 1.	The United States will reduce the federal income tax rate for individuals
3		and business by 5%. Furthermore, the United States tax code will be
4		changed so that no individual or business can take deductions that result
5		in their effective tax rate being more than 10% below their federal
6		income tax rate.
7	SECTION 2.	"Effective tax rate" will be defined as the total percent of taxable income
8		that is paid to the government in axes. "Federal Income Tax Rate" will be
9		defined as the tax rate that is assigned to the income bracket that the
10		individual or business falls into.
11	SECTION 3.	The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) will be tasked with the
12		implementation of this legislation.
13		A) The IRS will change current tax forms so that these forms include an
14		effective tax rate box.
15		B) The IRS will publish an annual report that will study the effects of this
16		legislation on the United States economy as well as the effect on the
17		federal budget.
18	SECTION 4.	This legislation will be enacted for fiscal year 2020.
19	SECTION 5.	All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Resolution to Amend the Constitution by Changing the 13th Amendment

1		BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:
2		<b>RESOLVED,</b> By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the
3		following article is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the
4		United States, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the
5		Constitution when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the severa
5		states within seven years from the date of its submission by the Congress:
7		ARTICLE
3	<b>SECTION 1</b> :	The thirteenth article of amendment to the Constitution of the United States
9		shall strike the phrase, "except as a punishment for crime whereof the party
10		shall have been duly convicted." It will now read, "Neither slavery nor
11		involuntary servitude shall exist within the United States, or any place
12		subject to their jurisdiction."
13	SECTION 2.	The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate
14	SECTION 2.	
15		legislation.

### A Bill to Require Body Cameras on All Law Enforcers

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

- SECTION 1. All law enforcers in the United States of America will hereby be required to have recording cameras on their persona at all times. Any law enforcers who fail to abide by these requirements will be excused from any and all duties through governmental law enforcement.
- "Law Enforcers" shall be defined as any body of government employee trained in methods of law enforcement and crime prevention and detection and authorized to maintain the peace, safety, and law over the community.

"Body Cameras" shall be defined as a live and functioning camera with audio capturing capabilities.

All footage will only be used in a court of law.

**SECTION 3.** The US Department of Justice will be responsible for making this change and ensuring businesses who sell these cameras comply

The US Department of Justice will be responsible for funding.

**SECTION 4.** This bill will be put into action one year after passing.

**SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

**SECTION 1.** Any member in a federal courtroom in the United States shall be allowed to use a camera

**SECTION 2**. A camera will be defined as a device for recording visual images in the form of photographs, film, or video signals

**SECTION 3.** The US Department of Justice will be responsible for making this change and ensuring anyone in a federal court is allowed to bring a camera and record what they wish

**SECTION 4.** This bill will take effect be put into effect on January 1, 2020

**SECTION 5.** All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null and void.

# A Bill to Provide Assistance to the Venezuelan Democratic Unity Roundtable

3		the Venezuelan government and allocate 1.5 Billion dollars to the
4		Democratic Unity Roundtable.
5	SECTION 2.	The Democratic Unity Roundtable shall receive all funding by fiscal year
6		2019.
7	SECTION 3.	The United States International Trade Commission and Department of
8		State will jointly oversee the complete sanction of Venezuelan Trade. The
9		U.S. Department of State shall ensure that the funds reach the
10		Democratic Unity Roundtable.
11		A. If necessary, the United States shall call upon allies in order to
12		prevent Venezuelan obstruction of allocated funds.
13	SECTION 4.	This Bill shall take effect December 1, 2017.

# A Bill to Amend the Constitution to Abolish the Electoral College and Provide for the Election of the President and Vice President Through Instant-Runoff Voting

1	RESOLVED,	By two-thirds of the Congress here assembled, that the
2	following artic	cle is proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of the
3	United States	, which shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of the
4	Constitution v	when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the
5	several states	within seven years from the date of its submission by the
5	Congress:	
7		ARTICLE
3 9	SECTION 1:	The President and Vice President shall be elected jointly by
10		the vote of the citizens of these United States in accordance
11		with the instant-runoff method of elections.
12	SECTION 2:	Instant-runoff voting shall be defined as a system in which
13		all candidates are ranked numerically by each voter, and,
14		should any candidate fail to gain over fifty percent of all first
15		choice votes as indicated by (1), a runoff shall be held in
16		which the candidate with the fewest votes is removed and
17 18		their votes reallocated to the next ranked candidate of each
19		voter. This process shall continue until one candidate has
20		reached a majority.
21	SECTION 3:	The ballot for the President and Vice President shall be
22		separate from the ballot for all other state and federal
23		officials.
24	SECTION 4:	This amendment shall take effect on the date of the

5	WHEREAS,	These individuals often have no options besides joining extremist, militant
6		organizations; and
7	WHEREAS,	The United States has the resources to take these individuals in, providing
8		shelter and welfare; and
9	WHEREAS,	Taking in Uighurs would provide a powerful bargaining chip for dealing with
10		the Chinese government; now, therefore, be it
11	RESOLVED,	That the Congress here assembled shall attempt to accept 5,000 asylum
12		seekers of Uighur descent from Xinjiang Uighur Autonomous Region in the
12		People's Republic of China.

#### A RESOLUTION TO BRING AN END TO THE PERSECUTION OF THE ROHINGYA PEOPLE

1	WHEREAS,	The Burmese government denies the Rohingya people citizenship, rendering
2		them stateless; and
3	WHEREAS,	The UN has described the human rights violations in Myanmar against the
4		Rohingya people as crimes against humanity; and
5	WHEREAS,	Ultra-nationalist Burmese buddhists are participating in illegal and systemic
6		religious discrimination against the Rohingyas; and
7	WHEREAS,	Extrajudicial killings, gang rapes, arsons, and other brutalities have become
8		commonplace offenses against the Rohingyas; and
9	WHEREAS,	There exists a substantial, international refugee crisis of Rohingya people fleeing
10		from Myanmar; thus
11	RESOLVED,	That the Student Congress here assembled make the following recommendation
12		to the UN to pursue heavy sanctions against Myanmar.
